# TYPE 0

#### RULES, LAWS OF NATURE, GENERAL TRUTHS ETC.

#### **If** + **Present Simple** → **Present Simple**

- If you heat water to 100 Celsius degrees, it boils.
- If you don't do your homework, you don't get any dessert.



### MALE

#### POSSIBLE, REAL CONDITION AND RESULT IN THE PRESENT OR FUTURE

### If + Present Simple → Present Simple / Future

- If it **doesn't** rain, **we'll go** to the park.
- If he manages to buy the tickets, we're going to see the concert on Friday.
- If I find it, I'll tell you.







The speaker feels that there is a real chance that the event in the *if* clause will happen.

### MPE2

### POSSIBLE BUT UNREAL CONDITION AND RESULT IN THE PRESENT OR FUTURE

#### If + Past Simple $\rightarrow$ Would [do/go/...]

- If I **found** a wallet in the street, I'd take it to the police station.
- What **would** you do if you **won** a million dollars?
- If there were (was) an election tomorrow, who would you vote for?
- If I were (was) you, I'd talk to him.







The speaker doesn't really expect that the event in the *if* clause will happen, but it isn't impossible.

- If you took more exercise, you'd feel better.
- I'm not tired. If I went to bed now, I wouldn't sleep.
- If they **took** a cab, they **could** be there at 5 o'clock.
- If you **read** this book, you **might** be able to pass the exam.

We also use Type 2 to say that if something happens *NOW*, something else will happen. We use Past Simple but the meaning is *present*.



We don't normally use *would* in the *if* part of the sentence. **Exception**: we can use *would* if we politely ask somebody to do something.

• [from a formal letter] I would be grateful if you would let me know your decision as soon as possible.

### TYPES


### IMPOSSIBLE, UNREAL CONDITION AND RESULT IN THE PAST

#### **If** + **Past Perfect** → **Would have** [done/gone/...]

- If I had known you were in hospital, I would have gone to see you.
- If I'd seen you, of course I would have said hello.
- If I hadn't been so tired, I would have gone to the party.
- If the weather hadn't been so bad, we could have gone out.



The events we're talking about are already in the past, so nothing can be done to change them.







# TYPE2+TYPE3

# OF THIS HAPPENED OR WAS TRUE IN THE PRESENT, WE WOULD HAVE HAD THIS RESULT IN THE PAST



### If + Past Simple → Would / Could / Might have [done/gone/...]

- If you were an actor, you could have entered the press conference last week.
- If I were you, I would have talked to him at once and explained the whole thing while it still wasn't too late.







# TYPE3+TYPE2

### IF THIS HAD HAPPENED IN THE PAST, WE WOULD HAVE THIS RESULT IN THE PRESENT OR FUTURE.

#### If + Past Perfect → Would / Could / Might [do/go/...]

- If you hadn't gotten into that fight at the party, she would still be your girlfriend now.
- If I hadn't acted like such a fool, I could go to Spain with her tomorrow.
